Painkiller 10 Times Stronger Than Vicodin Worries Experts

As pharmaceutical companies are approaching the final stages of development for a new type of painkiller said to be 10 times stronger than Vicodin, addiction experts worry a new wave of abuse may soon follow.

If approved, it would mark the first time patients could legally buy pure hydrocodone. Existing products combine the drug with nonaddictive painkillers such as acetaminophen.

Hydrocodone belongs to a family of drugs known as opiates or opioids because they are chemically similar to opium. They include morphine, heroin, oxycodone, codeine, and methadone.
"I have a big concern that this could be the next
OxyContin," said April
Rovero, president of the
National Coalition Against
Prescription Drug Abuse.

Oxycodone is now the mostabused medicine in the U.S., with hydrocodone second, according to the Drug Enforcement Administration.

Critics are troubled because a new narcotic painkiller can lead to more murders, pharmacy robberies, and millions of dollars lost by hospitals to treat overdose victims. Thousands of legitimate pain patients are becoming addicted to



powerful prescription painkillers, they say, in addition to the thousands more who abuse them illegally.

The CDC said last month that prescription painkillers caused 15,000 U.S. deaths in 2008, more than triple the 4,000 deaths in 1999. The U.S. consumes 99 percent of the world's hydrocodone and 83 percent of its oxycodone.

Exxon's Shale Driller Tightens Drug Testing for Rig Workers

New Protocol Already Showing Results



Union Drilling Inc., the rig owner hired by Exxon Mobil Corp. to explore U.S. shale rock formations for natural gas, toughened drug testing of rig workers in an attempt to cut down on accidents. Drug abuse tends to be more frequent among drilling crews than other oilfield workers.



Union is switching to hair tests from urinalysis to detect drug use, Chief Executive Officer Christopher Strong said at the Pritchard Capital energy conference. The new protocol already has reduced emergency calls from its drilling sites, he said, according to a transcript of his presentation.

"The screening process on new hires has really been ramped up a lot," Strong said. "We're just not seeing nearly as much hotline traffic about problems on the rigs."

68% of Males Arrested Tested Positive for Drugs

A new federal study found that 68 percent of adult men booked into the Hennepin County jail tested positive for illegal drug use during a random, voluntary sampling conducted earlier this year.

Marijuana was the most common drug detected — 55 percent of those arrested tested positive — followed by cocaine at 16 percent, opiates at six percent, methamphetamines at 4 percent and oxycodone at 1.5 percent. Nearly 19 percent of the new inmates tested positive for more than one drug.

Worldwide Illegal Drug Use Estimated 1 in 20 People Taking An Illegal Drug

Between 149 million and 271 million people worldwide used an illicit drug at least once in 2009, according to a new review of studies attempting to estimate the extent of the problem. That translates to 1 in 20 people aged 15 to 64 taking an illegal drug.

But this global figure is likely to underestimate the number of users, the researchers warn, since people might not want to admit to illegal use in surveys, and data from the poorest countries is limited.


